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On the left side of the street you will see the slopes that descend towards the river, while on the right side is the wall that supports the parade ground. If you look at this wall, you will see many signs that remind us that corrals and houses were placed against it. There are cupboards, old fireplaces, doors, and balconies. In fact, Bonaire Street had no direct exit on the western side of the wall.

Archbishop Hernando de Aragón was the illegitimate son of King Ferdinand the Catholic. He was viceroy of Aragon and his coat of arms was made up of the same elements that make up the coat of arms of Spain. There you will see the castles and lions of the Crown of Castile, the bars of Aragon, the chains of Navarre and the pomegranate of the old Muslim kingdom. In addition, the shield is surrounded by the symbolism of an abbot, because Hernando de Aragón was also a monk.

Bonaire Street receives this name because, except on very calm days, the wind blows strongly along it, due to its orientation towards the north wind.

Now go through the portal, stand outside the old wall and listen to audio track 4.
